NEW ULM, MINNESOTA'S FIRST WORLD WAR I CASUALTY: CORPORAL BENJAMIN J. SEIFERT

New Ulm, Minnesota's first World War I casualty occurred April 2, 1918 when Corporal Benjamin J. Seifert was killed in an aeroplane accident in Scampton, England. Seifert was born to Mr. & Mrs. Christ Seifert in Milford Township, Brown County, Minnesota March 11, 1895. The family moved to New Ulm in 1910, where he graduated from New Ulm High School. After attending Mankato Commercial College he engaged in several businesses, the last being in Valley City, North Dakota. He was called to service by the Brown County Draft Board, and left for training at Camp Dodge, Iowa in September of 1917.

The Seifert family was notified of Benjamin's death April 6, 1918 by a telegram from M. C. Cain, Adjutant General, in the War Department in Washington, D. C. which read: "We deeply regret to inform you that it is officially reported that Corporal Benjamin J. Seifert, aero squadron, died of aeroplane accident, April 2nd."

Further information and detail came in a letter from W. R. Castle, Director of Communications of the American Red Cross, also with headquarters in Washington, D. C. "The accident occurred ... at the American section of the aviation camp at Scampton, Eng., which is near Lincoln. It was caused by the machine run by Lieut. Hugenin getting out of control, when flying low. It pitched Lieut. Hugenin out and then crashed into a machine on the ground, killing Corporal Seifert and Private Krantman. All three men were killed instantly, so you know at least that there was no suffering. Your son's commanding officer, Lieut. Hampton, told our representative that he thought most highly of Seifert; that he considered him to be one of the best men in the organization and that in the past he had relied upon him in every way. This, I know, you will be glad to hear, because it will show you that your son not only died in the course of duty, but that his excellent performance of duty had enabled him to do such good work that h

respected by his officers.

"The funeral of the three men took place with full military honors on April 8 and they were buried in Newport Cemetery in Lincoln. The graves in this cemetery are always taken excellent care of by the British authorities. The American Red Cross had a beautiful spray of flowers put on each coffin and nothing was omitted that would possibly have been done in the way the family would have wanted it done. As soon as the graves are in order photographs will be taken and sent us to forward to you."

The remains of Corporal Seifert were returned in November of 1920 and re-buried in the New Ulm Catholic Cemetery. His grave marker reads:

Seifert

J.S. American Legion Logo Corp. Ben J. SEIFERT Corp. Seifert was among the first from the Brown Cty. area to be drafted into W. W. I... And the first to give his life for his country in an aeroplane accident. Post #132 was given his name on April 23, 1921. 1895 - 1918

#### WILLIBALD C. BIANCHI OF NEW ULM, MINNESOTA, AWARDED THE CONGRESSIONAL MEDAL OF HONOR FOR VALOR ABOVE AND BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY By George L. Glotzbach

Willibald C. Bianchi was born in New Ulm, Minnesota March 12, 1915. "Bill" as he was called, lived on a poultry farm overlooking the confluence of the Cottonwood and Minnesota Rivers. His grandparents originated in Schleswig-Holstein, Germany. When his father died in a hunting accident, Bianchi dropped out of his sophomore year of high school to operate the farm with his mother, Carrie Eibner Bianchi, who was also the premier baker at Eibner's restaurant.

Bianchi completed his high school through the University of Minnesota extension program. He then enrolled in the animal husbandry program at South Dakota State University. There he went out for boxing and ootball, and joined the Reserve Officers Training Corps. Upon graduation in 1939 Bianchi was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Army. He was transferred to the Philippines in April, 1941 and assigned to train

The Japanese attacked the Philippines shortly following their attack on Pearl Harbor December 7, 1941. The defenders were driven back onto the Bataan peninsula where Bianchi's heroism took place. His Citation reads:

"BIANCHI, WILLIBALD C. Rank and Organization: First Lieutenant, 45th Infantry, Philippine Scouts. Place and Date: Near Bagac, Bataan Province, Philippine Islands, 3 Feb. 1942. Entered Service at: New Ulm, Minn. Birth: New Ulm, Minn. G. O. No.: 11, 5 Mar. 1942. Citation: For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity above and beyond the call of duty in action with the enemy on 3 Feb. 1942, near Bagac, Province of Bataan, Philippine Islands. When the rifle platoon of another company was ordered to wipe out two strong enemy machine-gun nests, Lieutenant Bianchi voluntarily and of his own initiative, advanced with the platoon leading part of the men. When wounded early in the action by two bullets through the left hand, he did not stop for first aid but discarded his rifle and began firing a pistol. He located a machine-gun nest and personally silenced it with grenades. When wounded the second time by two machine-gun hest and personally shericed it with grenades. When wounded the second time by two machine-gun bullets through the chest muscles, Lieutenant Bianchi climbed to the top of an American tank, manned its antiaircraft machine gun and fired into strongly held enemy position until knocked completely off the tank by a third severe wound."

When Bataan fell on April 9, 1942 Bianchi was captured. He survived the Bataan Death March and was imprisoned in multiple Japanese camps. Late in the war he was transferred to an unmarked Japanese prison ship. On January 9, 1945 that ship was bombed and Bianchi was killed. Mrs. Carrie Bianchi received a letter of sympathy signed by General Douglas MacArthur, Commander-In-Chief, United States Army Forces, Pacific, dated October 25, 1945.

In the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific in Honolulu, Hawaii, Section MA, Grave 39 lies a plaque which reads: "In Memory of WILLIBALD C. BIANCHI, Medal of Honor, Capt. U.S. Army, World War II."

In the New Ulm City Cemetery, in the Soldiers Rest section, a flag pole stands, and a plaque begins: "This flag pole & flag are dedicated to the memory of CAPT. WILLIBALD C. BIAN-CHI, Congressional Medal of Honor. American Legion Post 132 was renamed "Seifert-Bianchi" in his honor July 28, 1990" followed by the text of his Citation. On the plaque are the logos of the Medal of Honor and the American Legion.
